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
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Awaiting Spring (detail; oil, 36x48) by Brent Cotton.

HOW I GOT STARTED CREATING ART: "Td retired from legal practice in the U.K. to move to the U.S. with my husband in 1999. I hadn't tried pastels-or even heard of them-until I met a local art teacher at a show in New Hampshire

My PROCESS: "I always start a painting from my travel photos. For this painting, I initially stuck fairly close to the photograph but soon discovered there were elements I didn't like-colors that weren't

enjoyed, and it ultimately eased my transition to more abstract landscape work.

INSPIRATION FOR THIS PAINTING: "I love the lines of trees you see all over the French countryside, usually in the middle of nowhere. But the main reason was that I wanted to try out a new color scheme and this line of trees was the lucky winner for the composition! .
